

Dominion (Fuck) to the Dismissed (Poems): New Creative Anthology Reclaims Contemporary Poetry

NEW ORLEANS, LA—Lavender Ink and Editor Vincent A. Cellucci boldly release a poetry anthology destined to cause controversy. Fuck Poems an exceptional anthology boasts over 50 living poet contributors. Fuck Poems includes work from contemporary legends, international poets, and poets receiving their first publication; the ultimate determination, superseding even great poetry, for publication was the willingness of the poets to be associated with such a project.

This work is traditional in the sense that poetry's history springs from subversion. This poetry anthology informs the carnal and vulgate with the poetic and creative agency they were born from, insisting that art is as vital as procreation. In the tradition of Sappho and Catullus, Henry Miller and Anais Nin, yet relentlessly contemporary, this collection with titillate and infuriate, arouse and denounce, appropriating the inappropriate until the norm dissipates.

Editor Cellucci says, "One of my main problems with poetry is that the public thinks there is some sort of specialized knowledge necessary to understand verse. In school, people are trained to see poetry as enigma, but poetry is pretty simple. This anthology is an effort to bring poetry out of the specialized genre's privacy and admit poetry into a much wider audience's pleasure zone." Cellucci also divulges the origin of this project: the annual themed-reading to celebrate the vernal equinox at the downtown Baton Rouge reading series he founded in 2008, River Writers. In the editor's note, he writes, "The levels of interpretation continued past the carnal: to dismissing the genre [poetry] entirely, forming a new-sub genre, and finally to the climactic contributor collaborative poem."

The most innovative thing about this anthology (besides its audacity) is the emphasis on the creative act. While typical poetry anthologies contain solely representations of previously-published work, Fuck Poems first celebrates its contributors individually and evenutally climaxes to a collaborative poem written in a shared Google Document all contributors were invited to contribute to and edit; the final form results from the most active collaborators and the editor.

Lavender Ink dares commit this anthology to paper and e-devices, but do you dare own it?

Cellucci's first book, of original post-Katrina verse, titled An Easy Place / To Die was released in 2011 from City Lit Press (Baltimore). He teaches communication in the College of Art and Design at Louisiana State University, where focuses on writing, teaching, and technology in the art and design disciplines. He attends River Writers (www.225riverwriters.blogspot.com) regularly.
